



The A.R.L. News Committee are sorry that Eric is leaving A.R.L. as he has done so much towards the production of the magazine. However as he is going to H.M.S. EXCELLENT, Portsmouth on promotion, our sorrow is tempered with joy and good wishes for his future.

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THE A.R.L. INFORMATION SECTION

In 1917 Sir Richard Paget investigated the possibility of detecting submarines by the use of seals trained to swim towards underwater noise targets. Performing seals were taken to the swimming bath at Great Smith St., Westminster, and encouraged by rewards of herrings to home on to a bell ringing under water. To borrow a euphemistic phrase from a report of a later era, "the experiments were not a success but much valuable experience was gained." The records of the many and various experiments undertaken in the course of the battle against the submarine menace during the 1914-1918 war are part of the archives of the Board of Invention and Research, later the Department of Experiment and Research, and copies of many of the reports as well as original manuscripts, are held in A.R.L.

In spite of Marshall McLuhan ("The medium is the message"), the written word is still, in 1968, the preferred method of recording what an experimenter has done, and at the present time far more than in 1917, co-operation between defence laboratories is carried on by interchange of reports. And in a wider sphere, results of scientific research are shared by way of published papers, which must therefore be made available.

The humble but necessary task of procuring, recording and distributing published and unpublished literature for the staff of A.R.L. is the job of the Information Section. This consists of the Library and Technical Records and there is a branch at Upper Lodge covering both aspects. Several thousand reports are received in A.R.L. every year and similar numbers of copies of published journals. The latter are displayed week by week in the Centre Block and Upper Lodge Libraries, the former are circulated to the most interested groups and listed in the weekly accession lists. The periodicals displayed in the Main Library could be more used than they are for "current awareness" purposes, but the move of this library to the ground floor should

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make it easier for all staff to pay, say, a weekly visit.

Those visiting the library for the first time will find that the books (and bound volumes of journals) are arranged in subject order. The library staff will be glad to help new users to find the sections of special interest to them. Some of the books will be out on loan at any given time, but the card catalogue, arranged under author, subject and title, is a complete record of the stock of books, specifications, pamphlets, etc.

Many readers do not seem to be aware that all unclassified reports are shelved in labelled boxes in the libraries under the name of the originating institution, so that an extensive if not complete file of, say, D.T.M.B. or N.R.L. reports can be perused in just the same way as numbers of a periodical. All reports, Classified and Unclassified, are of course recorded in Technical Records even if they have only come to us on loan.


The staff of the Information Section will be glad to make the subject index of reports, Classified and Unclassified, with its alphabetical key list of subjects, available for searches. More use would show up any defects and enable it to be improved, but even as it is, it is a useful tool.

The Library Committee was created as an advisory body to ensure that the needs of the Groups as regards the supply of information were being met as far as possible and to make suggestions for improvement. The Group representatives are:-Dr. Soole (Chairman), Mr. N. Wood, Mr. Scovell, Mr. Norman, Dr. Cook, Mr. Merriweather, Dr. Wilson and Mr. Rockliffe. 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KDF9 COMPUTER EXPANSION

At the beginning of 1961, M group sought approval for the replacement of its Pegasus computer with a very much more powerful KDF9. By the time the KDF9 computer was installed at A.R.L. early in 1965 it was becoming clear that this expensive machine was still not going to be large enough to cope with some of the jobs that were coming along. Also it was apparent that a computer large enough to cope with the big problems would also be able to do the smaller ones much more rapidly. No single R and D establishment in the Navy Department would produce by itself enough computing work, at least for some time to come, to justify the cost of a machine that was large enough for the big jobs. Therefore it was decided that establishments should share a few large computers via data links (which were described in the third issue of A.R.L. News) rather than each having its own smaller computer. The first stage in the implementation of this policy has been to considerably increase the size of the KDF9 at A.R.L., providing a powerful computer for naval R and D work. Four other establishments already have data links and others will follow in about six months time.

Expanding the computer and using data links requires not only more equipment but also more staff and space. Unfortunately the additional space will be the last to arrive. The demolition work going on round the gear-cutting workshop is, we hope, the forerunner of the erection of two extra floors above there to provide space for extra staff and equipment. In the meantime, M group is trying to design a double-decker desk in order to fit everyone into the existing space.

The main part of the computer expansion has been a big increase in the KDF9's storage space for programs and data, but other additions that will be of interest to potential users are as follows:

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- A fast output printer has been attached that is 1000 lines of information a minute.
- b) The graph plotter previously operated offline by Group G has now been attached to the computer.
- c) Direct access to the computer via typewriters will be possible for a number of users simultaneously.
- A standard IBM-compatible magnetic tape station has been attached.
- e) An interface has been fitted for attaching special equipment to the computer, such as an incremental magnetic tape reader for data from trials and experiments.

An additional capability acquired as the result of expanding the computer store is to run efficiently large computer programs written in the FORTRAN language. There are many more computer programs written in this language than any other in the world, and it will now be possible to get some of these that are of use to the Navy Dept. running on KDF9. There are many dialects of the FORTRAN language in use and the transference of the programs to KDF9 will often not be straightforward, but nevertheless this new capability will prove very useful.



It is not known widely as it should be that A.R.L. enjoys a high reputation in the world of science, in many of the fields of research engaged in, and that this is largely due to the efforts of a few of its more outstanding members. A good example of such a scientific ambassador is David Weston of L Group, whose published papers on underwater acoustics recently reached the satisfyingly round number of 100!

This impressive total has been mainly built up since 1951, when David joined A.R.L. from Imperial College, and not surprisingly, many of the 100 papers are in the form of A.R.L. Reports and Notes. However David has always been keenly aware that scientific information must be widely disseminated to be useful, and he has managed to have 42 of these papers published in journals outside A.R.L. This is quite an achievement considering that much of his work is necessarily classified. All this has helped to make him a world authority in his subject, whose opinions are sought and respected on such topics as underwater explosions, or the extraordinary behaviour of the fish in the sea. He is particularly well known in the U.S.A. where he recently worked for a year as an exchange scientist.

Within A.R.L. he is known as a prolific generator of ideas, and wins admiration for his deft handling of theory to fit the often awkward or baffling facts. He combines a becoming modesty with a generous nature, and will give unlimited time to helping and guiding junior staff. Even his weakness for intricate puns is forgiveable, though one suspects he gets sadistic enjoyment out of the groans which invariably follow these! In his spare time he greatly enjoys long tough walks in the country, an activity he

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shares with his wife Joyce, and sometimes with their baby daughter too. He also skis, plays regular tennis and badminton, and is ready for any other outdoor activity which presents itself.


David's contribution to science was officially recognised last year with the award of a Special Merit promotion to S.P.S.O.

We shall still see Mr. Burt at ARL for a few days each week yet as he is in the process of winding up several jobs in hand.


